Many have expressed concern over receiving so many advertisements from evite. I thought I would share the information provided by evite concerning this issue:

As advertisements are what allows us to keep Evite free of charge to users,

there is not a way to remove the advertisements that appear on free Evite invitations. However, you can change your "Event Type" to either "Kids Corner" or "Birthday for Kids" to prevent any alcohol-related or children-inappropriate advertisements from appearing on your invitation. To change your "Event Type," simply click on "Manage Invitation" and click on the "Edit Details" and then the Event Type drop-down menu to make the appropriate selection.

To remove any advertisements, you can use our Paid Premium Design, which you can filter on the left-hand side. Premium invites are paid for and therefore have no advertisements. They also include your own text customization, inserts for more information, animation with an envelope, and much more!".

To remove the advertising, we would need to buy the premium version or pick another vendor that would also charge us a fee. If we feel strongly about eliminating the advertising, then I will research the costs.



The following is Governor Sandoval's response to a call to his office in regards to the Governor's refusal to send National Guard troops to the U.S/Mexico border per a request from President Trump. The NvFRW asked members to call his office if they wished to express their opinions in regards to this issue.

Dear Mrs. xxxxxxx:

Thank you for taking the time to contact Governor Sandoval's office to share your concerns. We appreciate your correspondence, as it helps us to better serve all Nevadans.

Neither the President, the Department of Defense nor the Department of Homeland Security have communicated a proposed mission to the Governor or Nevada National Guard. Until such time that a specific mission is identified, the Governor, in consultation with General William Burks, the Adjutant General of the Nevada National Guard, reached the conclusion that sending Nevada Guardsmen and women to the border is not an appropriate use of Nevada National Guard resources.

As you may know, in the past, the Nevada Army National Guard has participated in border security missions, which amounted to both surveillance and life-saving mission sets in the performance of their border duties. If a proposal that was consistent with life-saving missions was necessary and/or requested, the Governor would consider such a proposal.

Again, we thank you for taking the time to reach out to our office and we hope you will contact us in the future regarding other topics of concern to you. Sincere regards,

MEMORIAL DAY

Memorial Day is an American holiday, observed on the last Monday of May, honoring the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military. Memorial Day 2018 occurs on Monday, May 28. Originally known as Decoration Day, it originated in the years following the Civil War and became an official federal holiday in 1971. Many Americans observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries or memorials, holding family gatherings and participating in parades. Unofficially, it marks the beginning of the summer season.

EARLY OBSERVANCES OF MEMORIAL DAY

The Civil War, which ended in the spring of 1865, claimed more lives than any conflict in U.S. history and required the establishment of the country's first national cemeteries.

By the late 1860s, Americans in various towns and cities had begun holding springtime tributes to these countless fallen soldiers, decorating their graves with flowers and reciting prayers.

Did You Know?

Each year on Memorial Day a national moment of remembrance takes place at 3:00 p.m. local time.

It is unclear where exactly this tradition originated; numerous different communities may have independently initiated the memorial gatherings. Nevertheless, in 1966 the federal government declared Waterloo, New York, the official birthplace of Memorial Day.

Waterloo—which first celebrated the day on May 5, 1866—was chosen because it hosted an annual, community-wide event, during which businesses closed and residents decorated the graves of soldiers with flowers and flags.

DECORATION DAY

On May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan, leader of an organization for Northern Civil War veterans, called for a nationwide day of remembrance later that month. "The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land," he proclaimed.

The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn't the anniversary of any particular battle.

On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Union and Confederate soldiers buried there.

Many Northern states held similar commemorative events and reprised the tradition in subsequent years; by 1890 each one had made Decoration Day an official state holiday. Southern states, on the other hand, continued to honor their dead on separate days until after World War I.

HISTORY OF MEMORIAL DAY

Memorial Day, as Decoration Day gradually came to be known, originally honored only those lost while fighting in the Civil War. But during World War I the United States found itself embroiled in another major conflict, and the holiday evolved to commemorate American military personnel who died in all wars.

For decades, Memorial Day continued to be observed on May 30, the date Logan had selected for the first Decoration Day. But in 1968 Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which established Memorial Day as the last Monday in May in order to create a three-day weekend for federal employees; the change went into effect in 1971. The same law also declared Memorial Day a federal holiday.

Memorial Day isn't just about honoring veterans, its honoring those who lost their lives. Veterans had the fortune of coming home. For us, that's a reminder of when we come home we still have a responsibility to serve. It's a

continuation of service that honors our country and those who fell defending it.



WHY POPPIES ON MEMORIAL DAY?

In 1915, inspired by the poem "In Flanders Fields," Moina Michael replied with her own poem:

We cherish too, the Poppy red That grows on fields where valor led, It seems to signal to the skies

That blood of heroes never dies.

She then conceived of an idea to wear red poppies on Memorial Day in honor of those who died serving the nation during war. She was the first to wear one, and sold poppies to her friends and co-workers with the money going to benefit servicemen in need. Later a Madam Guerin from France was visiting the United States and learned of this new custom started by Ms. Michael. When she returned to France she made artificial red poppies to raise money for war orphaned children and widowed women. This tradition spread to other countries. In 1921, the Franco-American Children's League sold poppies nationally to benefit war orphans of France and Belgium. The League disbanded a year later and Madam Guerin approached the VFW for help.

Shortly before Memorial Day in 1922 the VFW became the first veterans' organization to nationally sell poppies. Two years later their "Buddy" Poppy program was selling artificial poppies made by disabled veterans. In 1948 the US Post Office honored Ms. Michael for her role in founding the National Poppy movement by issuing a red 3 cent postage stamp with her likeness on it.
